Distributor Fun with the Midget

So, the Midget has been running poorly for the last year. Here's my story.

THE PROBLEM - Let's step back in time about a year, on my way home from a LANCO MG event (Covered Bridge tour and ice cream IIRC) in my 1970 MG Midget and it starts running poorly. The idle is fine, but under load the car has no power. Upon arriving home and inspecting the car I determined the Distributor was to blame. The mechanical advance mechanism was to put it lightly FUBAR. Thinking back on how the car had run up to that time I realized the Distributor has been going bad for quite some time now. The advance weights would stick and cause the idle to be high before they would release and the idle would come down.

FIRST REPAIR - I purchased an aftermarket Distributor from the Jungle Site (Amazon). The unit seemed to be of decent quality and did get the midget running again. But something was not quite right. At first the car ran ok-ish, but the problems were soon to follow.

ONGOING ISSUES - Soon after replacing the Distributor the issues started - hard starts and poor idling. At first, I adjusted the idle screws on the carburetors and cleaned the plugs. This helped some and the Midget ran ok for a while. Then the problems returned. The Midget would idle very high for about 20 seconds then the idle would drop off and the car would not run without pumping the gas, but the power while running down the road was good. More plug cleaning and this time I adjusted the mixture on the Carburetors. The problems continued with me adjusting the carburetors and cleaning plugs. I removed the plug wires one by one to inspect them and found rust on the Distributor cap end of one of them. I replaced the wires and distributor cap. The Hard starting and lack of idle plaqued me for an entire year with me cleaning plugs and trying to adjust the carburetors.

THE CLIMAX - Friday July 5th, 2024, I was doing an oil change and tried tuning the Midget again with very little luck. After the car work was done and I was relaxing with a beer, my brain kicked in. I remembered I have a 1968 MGB which is apart for a rebuild and the Distributor is just ready to test in the Midget. Saturday the 6th I was going to drive the Midget to our club's CCC, but the car had different ideas. I did get it to start, but it stalled. I was able to get the car running enough to back it into the driveway, but it stalled again. Now I could not get it to restart. I decided to push the Midget back into the garage and take my MINI to the CCC. After returning from the CCC I found my MGB Distributor and installed it on the Midget. The Midget responded by starting right up and running well. Not being able to leave things alone, I was inspecting my aftermarket Distributor and found the point gap to be almost 0. Seriously it had to be about 0.001". THE SMOKING GUN! The adjustment screw was on the loose side, so I reset the point gap, tightened the adjusting screw and reinstalled the Distributor on the Midget (Yes, I want to keep the B's Distributor for the B). I quickly set the timing and took the Midget for a short drive. Power was low, but it was running, and I was happy. Sunday July 7th my wife and I took the Midget for a drive to do some shopping. The car seemed to be getting hot on the way to the shop. On the way home it was very hot and backfiring a bit. One more time under the car to check the timing. I found the timing to be retarded by 10 Deg. OK how did this happen? Well, I'll tell ya! Yesterday when I timed the Midget, I was so excited it was running I forgot to disconnect the vacuum advance. DUH. Now with the car timed correctly, I went for one last drive and it's finally running well. Power is back, no spitting and sputtering, running cool and when the car is turned off it shuts right down and does not diesel.

MORAL - Moral of the story is when you replace a part on your car and then have some problems that part is probably the cause. If I had checked the Distributor when the Midget was running poorly, I would have found the point gap closing, adjusted it and tightened the screw.

So yes, I had a screw loose for the last year.
